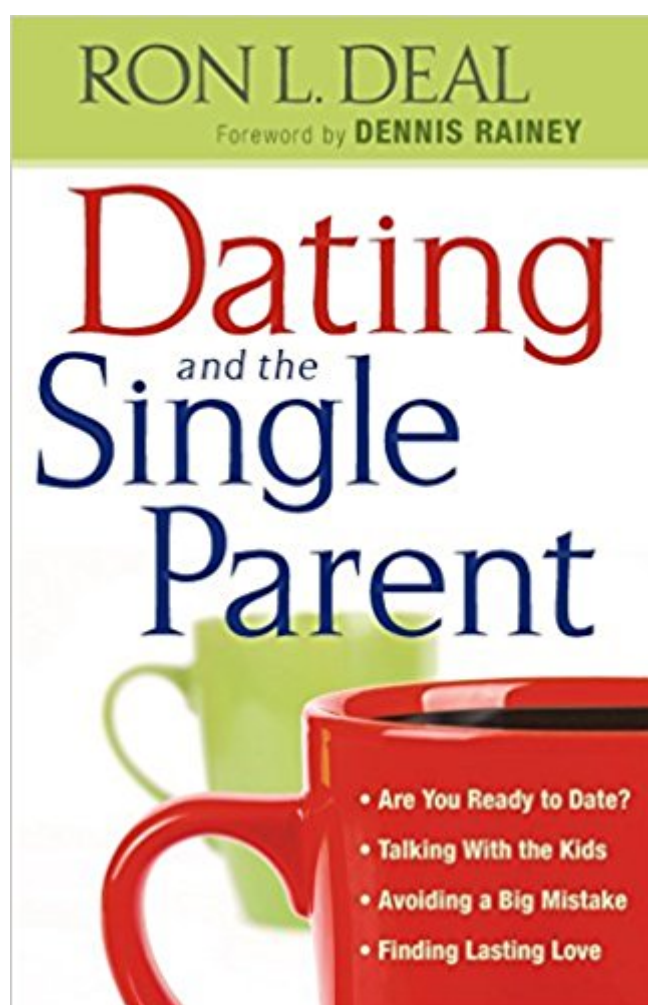

This book is certainly beneficial for single parents who are looking to date or are already in a dating relationship. The author discusses and helps dispel many of the fears that accompany the thought of dating again and also lists some important "red stoplights" to keep an eye on while in a relationship. Ron L. Deal does an amazing job of highlighting the importance of both "coupleness" and "familyness." I think that, more often than not, when couples are excited to remarry, they fall into the myth that the children will share in the couple's excitement. Children move at their own pace, and Deal discusses this truth throughout the book from a solid Christian perspective. My only complaint about this book is the author's constant demand to buy his other books or to attend his seminars. These shameless plugs were annoying and definitely interfered with the flow of the book.

The only "negative" thing I have to say about this book is I wish I had read it before I got remarried. This book is definitely a must-read for ANYONE considering remarriage where children are involved - either your own or someone else's. My husband had 3 children from 2 other women when we married. It has been an extremely difficult journey & this book outlined each of the challenges we have faced personally. I actually had to read this book for a graduate school course, and I think every person who knows someone who is considering remarriage when children are involved needs to tell them about this book. I also had some concerns that were addressed in this book that validated my concerns in a couple of areas. My husband would not receive the information from me, but he was receptive to the information coming from a book. I highly recommend all of Deal's books & his website to all single parents. Excellent book!

This book has some of the best advice out there. It delivers the complete story and highlights that a

remarriage involves more than just the two people getting married but the entire package. The aspects that most people don't address or don't want to address are thoroughly covered by the book and the author gives sound guidance with examples on how to proceed. It has a Christian-based approach, but the message is universal. If you are a single parent considering dating, already dating or almost ready to wed, do yourself a favor and read this book. As a side note, my ex-husband made all of the mistakes getting into a new relationship/marriage/blend family too quickly and without any safeguards. We are all paying for those mistakes now, very dearly, and will into the future.

This book will scare you and make you wonder how this will ever work. But it is this honesty that is necessary to make it work. Very straight forward, lots of practical ideas and HOW to do them. It is a lot of hard work, but now I can put together a plan. My family is worth it!

I am a pastoral counselor and a graduate student in Professional Counseling. I also happen to be fifty-something and dating a single parent. This book was assigned for a course I took at Liberty University. While this book is not a text book (that is a good thing) our course director found it worthy of featuring in the course. I am so glad the director made this decision. This book is frank, practical, and thought provoking. It addresses the hard questions and even harder realities of dating when there are children in the mix, whether minor children or adult children doesn't matter; the pitfalls are there and one is foolish to ignore the dynamics. This book is written from a strong Biblical perspective, as one might expect from Ron Deal, but this book is an integrative work, bringing together spiritual principles and hard data from rigorous scholarly study. Notably, this book accommodates reading from the perspective of the parent and the perspective of the non-parent dating (or contemplating dating) a parent. The book encourages its readers to do the hard work of relationship building. This includes defining the relationship (out loud, with each other) at every step; taking no shortcuts; and being willing to let one's head lead over one's heart when the match is not a good one. This book is good reading for one who desires to do well in the next relationship. This book will not be a fun read for one seeking platitudes and easy assurances that love conquers all.

This book touches key issues related to handling the blending of families with an new dating partner/spouse that I would have otherwise never anticipated. My new partner and I are following closely and noting that our experience is paralleling the examples Ron lays out. We are currently at the point where we know we are serious and would normally be moving to engagement, however,

Ron's insights and guidance have identified the importance of patience in allowing my family to get on the same page with us. Its prayer, patience, listening and communication. This book could not have come to my attention at a more important time! Thanks, Ron.

I gave this book 5 stars because the writer has to be the most innovative single parent strategist in the world. If you want to learn from the best you must learn from Ron L. Deal. By the way, he has a website as well. If you want to find all the "land mines" awaiting you before you embark on a blended family you should begin with this book.
